
Westminster Abbey

We mark the tenth anniversary of the Commonwealth Charter, signed by Her Late Majesty The Queen. We rejoice in the eager desire expressed there to build and sustain shared values and to have concern for the vulnerable.

In our service today, we will thank God for the work and witness of the youth of the Commonwealth, and we will pray for peace. We will pray too for our King as we look to the day when we will gather here again in loyalty and affection. As people of faith, hope, and compassion we shall pray for the peoples of Turkey, Syria, and Ukraine, and all for whom the last year has brought great suffering and loss.

Here we rejoice in our common life. Confident in God's grace we will gather the richness and range of our lives into the shared offering of a common people with one hope under God.

In August 2022, Pakistan was hit by devastating floods, submerging huge swathes of the country. More than 1,700 people were killed and two million homes damaged or destroyed.
